Hello everyone! My name is Maria Fernanda Bonilla-Cooksey and I am from Costa Rica. In 2001, when I was 19 years old, I came to North Carolina. Costa Rica is a small country in Central America, located between Nicaragua and Panama. Costa Ricans are known as "Ticos" and Spanish is our mother tongue. Costa Rica has approximately 4.5 million inhabitants, which represents only 0.03% of the world's land area, but it possesses approximately 6% of the planet's biodiversity, with the largest protected area in the world (26.3% of its territory). 98% of Costa Rica's energy is derived from renewable resources, it has no army or military forces, and it has one of the highest literacy and life expectancy rates. I share these facts because they reflect Tico idiosyncrasies, including

ecological conservation, the belief in human rights and its advocacy, and an appreciation for education and peace.

Nowadays, I am the Spanish interpreter for the Children's Developmental Services Agency in Morganton/Hickory. Although I have lived longer in North Carolina than in Costa Rica, I still proudly identify myself as a Costa Rican, and as a Hispanic. Initiatives that seek to celebrate cultural diversity, such as the Hispanic Heritage one, are good tools to promote the education and participation of all members in the community. However, being Hispanic, I celebrate my cultural heritage every day both at home with my family and at work. My daughter speaks and reads Spanish, she talks to and visits her grandmother, grandfather, aunt, uncle and great-grandmother in Costa Rica, and she also identifies herself as Hispanic and Costa Rican. My cultural heritage is very important to me, both as an essential element to my identity and as a factor to my passion for Spanish speakers.

Hello, my name is Rosa Sanchez. I am the bilingual coordinator for the Family Support Network of Greater Forsyth. Although I was raised in the United States, I still feel proud to be Mexican. To be able to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month is a tremendous honor and it is good to pass this culture on to the youth. It is wonderful for the youth to know about our roots, respect our traditions, and to feel proud of those roots. Every year, when my children were young, I would explain to them the meaning of the colors of the flag. The three colors of the Mexican flag all contribute to the overall national character of the country they symbolize. Green stands for hope and prosperity, white stands for purity,

while red represents the blood that was shed by Mexico's heroes over the years. The eagle on the Mexican flag alludes to an important moment in Mexican history and culture dating back to the time of the Aztecs. Legend has it that one of their gods, Huitzilopochtli, told the Aztecs they should look for an eagle in a lake, sitting on a cactus and holding a snake in its claw. This is something I have instilled in my children, a little bit about the meaning of the Mexican flag. Although it is a small element of Mexican history, I think my children can explain to others what the flag means to a Mexicans. Being a Latina has helped me a lot throughout my life as well. The reason for this is that even when we are not family, we Latinos help each other.
