Transition from Early Intervention to Special Education Preschool Services in North Carolina

The transition from Early Intervention to Preschool Special Education Services can create feelings of excitement and uncertainty. Starting around your child's second birthday your child's Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) team, which includes you as the parent/guardian, will begin to develop a plan for transitioning your child from Early Intervention services to Special Education Preschool Services or other appropriate services. The plan will include timelines that will map out the transition process. A Parent's Guide to the Infant-Toddler and Preschool Programs has lots of information that can help you prepare for this transition. The table below may help everyone involved with this transition to understand the process so that it is as smooth as possible.

Within 3 months of your child's 3rd birthday	Local Education Agency (LEA) (Your local school district.)	 Preschool Services Eligibility Meeting: Review and explain evaluation reports. Discuss eligibility for special education services. If found eligible, explain Area of Eligibility and that needs drive services. Write the Individualized Education Program (IEP) or schedule another meeting to develop the IEP before the child's third birthday. If the family declines services or the child is not found eligible, discuss other options available in the community.
If your child is eligible, an IEP will be written within 30 days of your child's 3rd birthday	Local Education Agency (LEA) (Your local school district.)	 Individual Education Program (IEP) Meeting: Families provide information about their child (vision for the future, strengths, challenges, concerns, etc.) Review your child's Present Levels of Academic and Functional Performance which are based on data from the evaluations, teachers, and the family. Write academic and functional goals based on data from evaluations and from the IEP Team, which includes the family. Determine the Least Restrictive Environment in which the child will learn. Outline Special Education service time (how often and for how long). Determine Related Services to support the goals, which could include speech therapy, occupational therapy, counseling, interpreting services, mobility services, parent counseling and training, etc. Determine types of supplemental aids, support, accommodations and/or modifications needed, if any. Parental Consent for Services will be signed.
